Join us for a 2-day USEF-sanctioned seminar designed for athlete and coach development in para-equestrian dressage. Dressage coaches, adaptive riding instructors, and eligible athletes are encouraged to attend. Each day will start with morning lectures followed by 45-minute private mounted sessions, either as a coach or athlete. A participating athlete's coach is encouraged to learn the essential shadow-coaching technique*, allowing for individualized feedback and continual assessment. Registrants will receive information on how to prepare for a coaching session, as well as webinars on Para-Equestrian Sports as prerequisites for the seminar.

Space is limited to 6 riders. Auditors are welcome.

*Shadow Coaching is a specific and advanced application of coaching based on observation and feedback from the Master Coach, with reflective practice by the learning coach and athlete.

SHADOW COACHING TECHNIQUE

STRUCTURE OF THE LESSON: Preparation/Delivery/Evaluation

Shadow Coaching: The shadow coaching technique is defined as two coaches and one demonstration rider taking part in a training context. In this scenario, the coach trainee is presenting the material and technique to the rider while the shadow coach is evaluating and offering support directly to the coach trainee (and not to the rider) during the session. It is a unique experience of a coach's reflective practice, allowing time and space to observe and absorb in a mirroring effect. Once the session is over the coach trainee receives formal feedback from the rider, the shadow coach, and the Master Coach. An interactive discussion with fellow coaches can follow. Shadow coaching at competitions is a way to reinforce coaching effectiveness and prepare for unexpected challenges.



1) PREPARATION:

- These seminars/practicums will utilize a shadow coaching structure. Each coach will have an opportunity to be the coach trainee and the shadow coach, and will switch roles on Day 2.
- Prior to the lesson, both coaches will interview the rider about goals, challenges, adaptive equipment used, and type of mount.
- Together the coaches will set a plan for the 45 or 30 minute session (lower grade sessions more likely to be 30 minutes) focusing on one key riding competency/lesson objective (e.g. establishing contact). Coaches will be open to making adjustments on the lesson objective as the lesson warrants (e.g. safety, proficiency, horse movement, issues).
- Coach trainee will warm up rider 15 minutes ahead of time in separate arena. A safety check and preliminary rider/horse evaluation will take place.





SHADOW COACHING TECHNIQUE (cont.)

2) DELIVERY

- Coach trainee will introduce herself/himself, as well as the shadow coach, demonstration rider and the horse.
- Coach trainee will move to core of the lesson and state specific lesson objective, as the warm up has already taken place.
- Coach trainee will use both quantitative (what) skills and qualitative (how) skills to deliver the lesson.
- Coach trainee will be aware of coaching style/attributes/approach for teaching lesson.

THE "WHAT" OF THE LESSON

Technical riding skills to perform dressage movements accurately and in harmony with the horse, for example:

- Dressage Training Scale (rhythm, suppleness, contact/connection, impulsion, straightness, collection)
- · Transitions within the gait/ in and out of the gait
- · Lateral Work
- Test Movements/Ring Figures/Accuracy

THE "HOW" OF THE LESSON

- Explaining the human biomechanics that influence the horse's ability to perform dressage movements
- Effective use of aids (natural, artificial, compensating)
- · Use of visual demonstrations

UTILIZING COACHING ATTRIBUTES

Coaching Philosophy/Soft Skills:

- · Check in on understanding
- Clear communication
- · Repetition and practice
- · Positive reinforcement
- "Micro coaching"/breaking something down into smaller, more manageable parts
- Reflective practice

3) EVALUATION

- At the end of the session, solicit feedback from the rider about performance, understanding, and challenges.
- Solicit feedback from the shadow coach, from the Master Coach, and from fellow coaches in the gallery regarding the coach trainee's delivery, effectiveness, overall understanding and performance.
- Reflect and plan for Day 2 with a shadow coach/coach trainee role change.

The *Paralympic Equestrian Sport Initiative for Veterans* is a national initiative designed to support the growth and participation of eligible veterans with disabilities in para-equestrian sports (specifically para-dressage and para-driving). This initiative is coordinated by Carlisle Academy Integrative Equine Therapy & Sports, and is funded by a Federal Adaptive Sports Grant under the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs, in partnership with the United States Equestrian Federation and the Professional Association of Therapeutic Horsemanship. Participating USEF/USPEA International Para-Dressage Centers of Excellence (COE) and other approved centers will offer clinics, outreach, and ongoing education to emerging athletes and coaches to develop the sport pipeline.

PIPELINE DEVELOPMENT GOALS INCLUDE:

- Utilizing gold-medal coaching experts to provide para-dressage and paradriving clinics and symposia at COEs and other select national locations as training, sport classification, and awareness-building opportunities.
- Providing a National Para-Equestrian Coach Development Program to enhance coaching support of eligible veterans.
- Creating a strong foundation of Para-Equestrian education through online workshops/webinars.
- Encouraging para-eligible veterans to participate with the VA's Monthly Assistance Allowance Program to fund training and competition.
- Coordinating with veteran-oriented competitions and games to promote inclusion of Para-Equestrian sports.

What is Para-Equestrian Sport?

Para refers to parallel to able-bodied sports. designed for the independent rider/driver with permanent, physical and visual disabilities seeking a competitive track. Athletes may pursue a national or international sport classification which allows them to compete at recognized national and international horse shows in Para-Equestrian dressage or Para-Equestrian driving. Both sports are governed by USEF (national) and FEI (International) and are conducted in a similar fashion to their conventional counterpart (dressage and combined driving), but with riders divided into different competition sport classes/ grades based on their functional abilities. Para-Equestrian dressage is the only equestrian discipline recognized at the Paralympics.

VETERAN ASSISTANCE PROGRAM FOR PARA-EQUESTRIAN DRESSAGE

U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs

The VA supports military veterans in their efforts to represent the USA at International equestrian competitions. Veterans who demonstrate exceptional sport skills and the commitment necessary to pursue elite-level competition are given guidance on securing the training, support, and coaching needed to qualify for Team USA and achieve their Para-Equestrian dreams.

The VA Para-Equestrian Program helps to provide a monthly assistance allowance for disabled Veterans of the Armed Forces, as authorized by section 703 of the Veterans' Benefits Improvement Act of 2008.

Through the program, the VA will pay a monthly allowance to a Veteran with a service-connected or non-service-connected disability if the Veteran meets the minimum military standard or higher (i.e. Emerging, Talent Pool, National Team) in his/her respective sport at a recognized competition.

GENERAL PARA-EQUESTRIAN DRESSAGE ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS:

In addition to meeting the military standard, athletes must:

- Be 17 years or older.
- Be a U.S. citizen/Veteran.
- Must be a current member of USEF at the time that the Required Scores are achieved.
- Be medically eligible in accordance with the FEI Classification Manual for Para-Equestrian Competitions, http://inside.fei.org/sites/default/files/FEI%20Para%20Equestrian%20Classification%20Manual%20Final.pdf
- 5th Edition, April, 2017 Effective 24 April 2017 and Article 8422 of the Rules for FEI Para-Equestrian Dressage Events to compete in Para-Equestrian dressage competitions. To do so, riders shall have either a national or international Para-Equestrian classification and be assigned a Grade. For more information regarding classification, visit the FEI website at http://inside.fei.org/fei/disc/para-dressage/about. To schedule a national or international classification, contact Laureen Johnson at the USEF at 859-225-7693.
- Ride independently (without side aides).

REQUIRED SCORES:

- · A total of one score for each must be submitted as follows for the current competition year:
 - » One "Team" test score;
 - » One "Individual" test score;
- The minimum score of any FEI Novice Test A, FEI Novice Test B, FEI Introductory Test A, FEI Introductory Test B, FEI Individual or FEI Team test submitted must be 60% or higher;
- Scores may be submitted from any horse/rider combination:
- Scores shall be achieved at the Individual or Team test of the rider's Grade level (Gr. I V). FEI Para-Dressage Tests may be found at http://inside.fei.org/fei/your-role/organisers/p-e-dressage/tests
- All test scores (both rider and/or horse) must be achieved at USEF or FEI Para-Equestrian licensed competitions. FEI PE tests must be scored by a USEF "R" rated judge or above, or an FEI PE recognized judge.

REPORTING REQUIREMENTS

Athletes are required to submit legible copies of all qualifying tests, clearly indicating the name of the judge and competition at which the scores were achieved to Laureen Johnson, USEF High Performance Director of Para-Equestrian Programs at the address below.

VETERAN ASSISTANCE PROGRAM FOR PARA-EQUESTRIAN DRIVING

United States Equestrian Federation and U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs

The U.S. Equestrian Federation supports Para-Equestrian-eligible military Veterans in their efforts to represent the USA at upcoming Para-Equestrian World Championships and other International competitions. Veterans who demonstrate exceptional sport skills and the commitment necessary to pursue elite-level competition are given guidance on securing the training, support, and coaching needed to qualify for Team USA and achieve their Para-Equestrian dreams.

Through a partnership with the United States Department of Veterans Affairs, the VA Paralympic Program Office helps to provide a monthly assistance allowance for disabled Veterans of the Armed Forces, as authorized by section 703 of the Veterans' Benefits Improvement Act of 2008.

Through the program, the VA will pay a monthly allowance to a Veteran with a service-connected or non-service-connected disability if the Veteran meets the minimum military standard or higher (i.e. Emerging, Talent Pool, National Team) in his/her respective sport at a recognized competition.

GENERAL PARA-EQUESTRIAN DRESSAGE ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS:

In addition to meeting the military standard, athletes must:

- Be 17 years or older.
- · Be a U.S. citizen.
- Must be a U.S. Veteran with a permanent, physical disability
- Must be a current member in good standing of USEF at the time that the Required Scores are achieved.
- Be medically eligible in accordance with the FEI Classification Manual for Para-Equestrian Competitions, 5th Edition, April 2017
 rules for FEI Para-Equestrian Driving Events to compete in Para-Equestrian Driving competitions. To do so, Drivers shall have
 either a National or International Para-Equestrian Classification and be assigned a Grade. For more information regarding

- To schedule a National or International Classification, contact Laureen Johnson at the USEF at 859-225-7693.
- Drive independently (without second reins).

OTHER REQUIREMENTS:

• Must comply with all USEF and ADS (American Driving Society) requirements.

REQUIRED SCORES:

- A total of two scores for each must be submitted as follows for the current competition year:
- The minimum score of two driven FEI or ADS Dressage Tests at or above the ADS Preliminary Level at two USEF or ADS sanctioned Combined Driving Event must be below 65 penalty points and the entire event must have been completed successfully without Elimination, Retirement nor Disqualification.
- Scores for the entire event may be submitted from any horse/driver combination;
- All test scores (both driver and/or horse) must be achieved at ADS, USEF or FEI Para-Equestrian licensed competitions. FEI PE tests must be scored by a USEF "R" rated judge or above, or an FEI PE recognized judge. ADS tests must be scored by ADS "R" rated judges or above.

REPORTING REQUIREMENTS

Athletes are required to submit legible copies of all qualifying tests, clearly indicating the name of the judge and competition at which the scores were achieved to Laureen Johnson, USEF High Performance Director of Para-Equestrian Programs at the address below.
